Introductory Word from the Head



Dear Friends of Good Future,

It has been ten years since we started our systematic effort to learn the country's possible futures, identify its threats and development opportunities, and formulate visions, strategies and scenarios of its future development. Yes, the CESES is going to celebrate its tenth birthday in 2010.

Last year, we provided both experts and the general public with new material for thinking as well as for developing strategic and productive public policies. Essential information on those materials can be found in our homepage at <http://ceses.cuni.cz>.

Our publications find their way to readers both in our country and internationally. Of our Czech publications, I would like to mention two books. The first follows up with a past publication, *Strategic Choices for the Czech Republic: A Theoretical Framework*,¹ and was named *Czech Republic: Trends, Threats, Opportunities*. It is

predominantly empirical and sets the country's development in the context of external and internal development trends.² The second book summarizes the most important facts we know about values in the Czech society.³ Since scholarly communication has been increasingly taking place in English, we published an English edition of a title outlining our approach to the subject matter and application of strategic governance.⁴

Of course, our eyes turned to important events that, while originating outside the Czech Republic, had important consequences for the country's life. I myself attempted to analyze why social science failed to predict the risk of a global crisis outbreak, although it shook—often quite badly—the lives of billions of people worldwide.⁵ As part of our continuous effort to cultivate public dialogue, we offered 18 conferences, workshops and seminars to the broader professional community as well as the general public. In November, the fifth annual international security conference “Security of the EU and the Czech Republic in a multi-polar world in the wake of the 2010s” went in the successful footsteps of previous years.

Finally, let me mention a new project we set about in collaboration with the Department of Public and Social Policy, Faculty of Social Sciences, Charles University (FSV UK), entitled “From Practice to Theory and Back: Innovating the Master's and Doctoral Programs in Public and Social Policy”. As part of the Operational Programme “Prague – Adaptability”, it aims at raising the bar of teaching in this field by understanding and respecting the demands of governance practice, as relayed by the students themselves.

I believe that this Annual Report will contribute to better understanding of what we offer to you or your institution, and what we can offer to the entire country. We will be grateful for your comments as well as suggestions on how we might improve our work. Feel free to email them to ceses@fsv.cuni.cz or, even better, tell us personally at one of our next events.

National Research Projects

Visions and Strategies of the Development of Czech Society within the EU

The project is developed within the framework of a joint Research Intent of the Faculties of Social Sciences and Philosophy & Arts, Charles University (reg. no. MSM 0021620841). Its objective is to identify a set of relevant visions for modernizing the Czech Republic, to ascertain the parameters of existing potentials and moving forces for fulfilling them, and to develop possible strategies for accomplishing these visions within the Czech Republic as well as within the contexts of EU integration and global division of labour. It also aims to cultivate the conceptual and methodological framework for forecasting and policy making.

The project is divided into five subprojects:

Visions and Strategies of Czech Society's Development in the EU: Criteria, Coordination and Communication

This umbrella project coordinates other team projects and encourages communication in the public space as a prerequisite of creation and real-life implementation of visions and strategies. It promotes an overall framework for formulating comprehensive visions and strategies as well as a set of criteria related to quality and sustainability of life. Special attention is paid to the relationship between social cohesion and economic competitiveness.

Strategic Governance

The project chiefly aims to produce a theoretical framework for strategic governance research and collect empirical evidence about strategic governance processes (or their absence) on various levels, including international and transnational institutions, notably the EU. It also develops international comparison of approaches to strategic governance in other selected countries of the world.

Modernization and Its Actors

The project identifies existing potentials and moving forces behind the different visions of modernization. It analyses the abilities of leading social actors who carry visions and development strategies; the ways of their prospective thinking, their priority orientations, mutual conflicts, tensions and problems the solution of which is a necessary condition for fulfilling specific visions through specific strategies. This research is based on the interpretation of sizable datasets from international and national public/elite opinion surveys on relevant modernization issues.

Security

The project builds upon an extended concept of security and develops it at the theoretical and applied levels; identifies key factors influencing the security of the Czech Republic and the European Union; and formulates forecasts concerning security situations in the world, Europe and the Czech Republic. Members of the project team participate in expert discussions on formulating a new Security Strategy of the Czech Republic as well as other strategic documents.

Methodology of Analysing and Formulating Public Policies and Strategies

As a methodological umbrella for the entire “Visions and Strategies” project, it aims to foster the theory and methodology of comprehensive forecasting studies and to generalize practical experience with forecasting and public policy.

Shared Values and Norms of Behaviour as Sources of Strengthening Social Cohesion and Overcoming Adverse Impacts of Social Differentiation in the Czech Republic

Project no. 2D06014, National Research Programme, Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports of the Czech Republic

The 2006-2010 research project aims to analyze changes in the social structure as well as collect evidence for identifying social cohesion-enhancing factors for the Czech Republic as a whole. Analysis of new social differentiation processes and their associations with the Czech society's value, belief and norm structures will make it possible to develop methods to assist secondary socialization for better social cohesion.

The project of the Ministry of Interior of the Czech Republic, General Directorate of Fire Rescue Service of the Czech Republic – Institute of Population Protection, Lázně Bohdaneč – is realized from 2006 to 2010 and aims at forecasting future changes in the security environment and their effects on the Czech Republic's security policy.

From Practice to Theory and Back: Innovating the Master's and Doctoral Programs in Public and Social Policy

Operational Programme "Prague – Adaptability" project no. CZ.2.17/3.1.00/31197

The main objective of the project is to optimize the education content of Master's and doctoral programs in Public and Social Policy (KKOV classification codes: 67031T; 6731V016) at the Faculty of Social Sciences, Charles University in Prague, for the practical employability of graduates, by improving the quality of both the content of education and educational methods. The basic instrument in fulfilling this goal lies in the transfer of demands of practice (as they are articulated by the students of the combined Master's program) into education content and into the development of theory and methods in general (particularly in the content and outcomes of the doctoral program).

The following particular objectives are set for the project:

1. Analyze in detail the pre-identified demand of students (target group) and graduates working in practice for innovation in education toward effective public policy and administration. Collect data via questionnaire surveys in target groups.
2. Based on a detailed needs assessment for all potential target groups, prepare innovated Master's and doctoral programs in Public and Social Policy.
3. Form and test four new and two innovated courses on effective public administration as well as analysis and formulation of public policies and programs.
4. Provide students with innovation knowledge for effective practice of public policy and administration; in terms of skills, use practical case studies to stimulate in students the practical acquirement of methods for effective practice of public policy and administration.
5. Prepare course participants with teaching materials including an electronic testing system, and provide those in an accessible electronic form in order to enable each student to assess their own success in mastering the course subject.
6. Create an English version of the doctoral programme in order to join the European research and education area and improve the competitiveness of graduates in the labour market.
7. Innovate the Master's and doctoral programs by adding new, pre-tested courses. Submit those courses for re-accreditation.

International Research Collaboration

Civil Society and New Forms of Governance in Europe – The Making of European Citizenship – Network of Excellence (CINEFOGO)

Within this project under the 6th EU Framework Program (Contract no. 5133050), the CESES has joined a consortium of more than 40 universities and research centres. The mission of this network is to generate and disseminate findings about the development of citizenship and overlapping identities as well as to overcome civic apathies and social exclusion in Europe. Denmark's Roskilde University is the principal project coordinator. The CESES is the network's main coordinator for effective transfer of scientific evidence and best practices on to multiple target groups at various European Community levels; it is also the national coordinator for the Czech Republic.

The Role of Organized Civil Society for the Governance of Transition in the Czech Republic (CISOCICZ)

This was a project under the 6th EU Framework Program, approved by the European Commission as part of the Marie Curie Chair Program (Contract no. MEXC-CT-2005-02449). The CESES and the Department of Public and Social Policy of the Faculty of Social Sciences, Charles University, hosted Dr. Jürgen Grote of University of Konstanz (Germany), who analyzes interdependences and strategic behaviours of public and private sector organizations.

Finance and Mental Health Services Training in Czech Republic/Central Europe

The objective of the joint project of the CESES and School of Public Health, University of California, Berkeley, is to make high-level interdisciplinary post-doctoral studies in the US available to economists, sociologists, psychologists, physicians and/or graduates of other social or political sciences from the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Croatia, Bulgaria, and Romania.

A New Agenda for European Security Economics (EUSECON)

Under the 7th EU Framework Program, the CESES has participated, since March 2008, in the implementation of the project entitled, “A New Agenda for European Security Economics”. This falls under Theme 10 – Security. The project is coordinated by DIW Berlin with a consortium of 14 partners. It aims to outline a research framework for the field of “security economics” and to study the economic aspects of specific security problems and policies.

Established in 2007, ESRIF is a European Commission-supported informal voluntary group of experts. Its main objective is to develop a vision and priorities for European security research by the end of 2009. ESRIF has 11 working groups. CESES staff member Miloš Balabán, Ph.D. represents the Czech Republic in the ESRIF Working Group 5 (Foresight & Scenarios).

The Foresight & Scenarios WG ensures:

- 1) review of existing “foresight studies” in Europe, US and on national level (preparing scenarios of security situation development),
- 2) methodologies for managing security research and innovation,
- 3) application of “foresight studies” and scenarios to support public debate on security issues and problems.

2009 saw further issues of the **Central European Journal of Public Policy (CEJPP)**, which aims to relay the latest evidence-based theoretical and methodological advancements in public to policy researchers and professionals in different policy fields. As a peer-reviewed academic journal, the CEJPP is published in English and addresses a wide range of public policy topics including civil society, social services and healthcare, environmental protection, education, labour market, immigration, security, public finance and budgeting, administrative reform, performance measurement, governance etc. Such spectrum makes the CEJPP a multi-disciplinary journal which seeks balance between description, explanation and evaluation of public policies based on a wide range of social science methods, both qualitative and quantitative.

The journal's work was financially supported by the Ministry of Education, Youth and Sports of the Czech Republic, through a section of its Development Project for academic journals at the Faculty of Social Sciences, Charles University. The following development objectives were set and fulfilled within the framework of this project: (1) improving and stabilizing the journal's operational conditions and (2) introducing the journal to the international community and databases of academic journals.

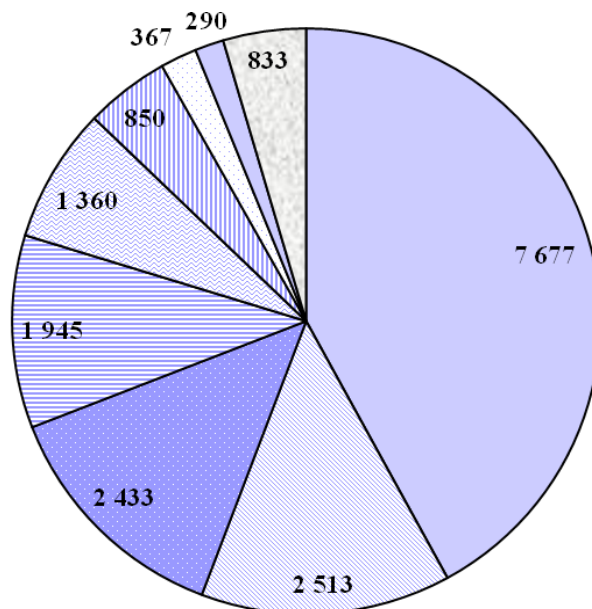

The Prague Conference on the European Way of Security	Organized by the Center for Security Policy, CESES FSV UK, the London School of Economics and Political Science and the Friedrich Ebert Foundation, the Prague conference focused on a doctrine for European security.
